


MESSAGE FROM OUR REGIONAL FORMATION DIRECTOR

Fraternity weekends are always busy, with planning and preparation, cooking for the potluck, phone calls asking questions and the unavoidable last-minute changes. If you ask JoAnne about it, she'll tell you it's not my favorite marathon.

But it's what we do, for lots of good reasons. Chief among them, Fraternity is a sign to the world that there's another way of looking at relationships. Instead of competing, pushing for powers or just trying to be seen, to Franciscans, relationships are where we meet Christ. They are a form of Eucharist. Think about it. God gives himself to us in the blessed bread and wine. Receiving this gift, we are united with God. He lives in us; we live in him. Multiply that by a church full of people and you have whole communities in whom God is present, active and seen. This is called "immanence" and it means the same thing as "Emmanuel". God is with us. This is what makes us effective signs to the world. The presence of Christ is his gift. We accept it and become his sacrament. This is why we come together in fraternity—love makes us one, and as one Body of Christ, we help each other grow along the way.

In our fraternity we like to do Candidate formation just before our Gathering. In our lesson today we were laughing at ourselves. As humans we are so clumsy in our relationships. We know where we wish to be, but often fall short. Sometimes it's spectacular how badly we can fail. But while we might feel like crying, it does help to laugh at ourselves in the company of friends, people who share our values, who know how hard it is to keep relationships going. I like it when people compare fraternity to being part of a family, because families seem to get special grace to hold us together through the hard times. It's not fun when we're suffering, but given enough practice, we begin to trust that things will get better, especially when we are willing to embrace our Eucharistic life.

To put it simply, people who believe in Christ in the Eucharist, who eat the bread and drink the wine, have a new life inside of them. And exploring this life is an important part of what we do as Secular Franciscans. We talk together about how Eucharist changes us, about how living with Christ gives us strength to imagine a new way of living, a way of forgiving, starting fresh, trying again... and trusting God to be with us. Eucharist is real food. It doesn't end or disappear when we leave Church. It goes with us. It is part of who we are and it gives us life in the living Kingdom of Heaven. All of this, and we don't even need a password...!

After our Fraternity Gathering, we are usually exhausted. But the wonders we see when like-minded people spend time together! The stories we hear! The victories we relate! The disasters too, the quiet cries for help and comfort, the promises of hope, the gathering and sharing of gifts. One of our Candidates explained today what it means to be "poor" and right away he had our Council weeping with amazement! These are treasures you can't buy. You have to invest yourself, your time, your strength and your prayer. You have to be willing to go out in the heat to join with your community and share your stories.

I just read this week how in the eighteen-fifties, friars in England had to encourage Seculars to meet once a month. The didn't gather regularly and without the support of fraternities, they failed to meet the social needs of their time and towns. Some modern Seculars don't have regular fraternities. Or get to Church often. Or discuss and debate the meaning of our Rule. Much of our life happens in fraternity, and from there goes out into the world to bear fruit. Without fraternity, I don't know how we would live the Gospel. But in fraternity I see both desire and growth, both prayer and service. I see people maturing in Franciscan values. I see the presence of Christ in his faithful people, and it isn't a passive presence. Rather, this Immanent Emmanuel, this living Person who is God-in-us is getting things done. Through us, God is building up his Bride, the Church. And it's a wonder to behold...!

THOUGHTS FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT 2024

And this will be a sign for you: you will find an infant wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger." Luke 2: 12

In the Order for Christian Initiation for Adults, we teach that the

sacraments of our Church are "effective signs of God's grace." This means that the sacraments "do what they say". Baptism initiates. Eucharist unites. Confirmation seals and completes. It is through such "signs" that we are made into New Creatures, fit for living in the eternal Kingdom of Heaven.

What is the Sign of Christmas? A baby wrapped in warm clothes in a box made to hold food for farm animals. Even Linus can tell Charlie Brown what it means: good news for all people! Very, very good news...

But what does this Sign do? What real graces does this helpless

baby bring to our world? Since this sign was so important to Francis, let's look at what it has caused to happen among his followers...



Minority: Franciscans grow to believe that it is better to "be with (and among) the people rather than to be over them." Authority and leadership are forms of service, enriched by listening, dialog, and effective action.

Mercy: Franciscans choose forgiveness over condemnation; patience over irritation, and acceptance over rejection.

Membership: United in the Body of Christ, Franciscans see Christ in everyone they meet, honoring each person's sacredness and destiny...

Mutuality: Franciscans trade the words "I, me and my" for "we, us and ours". They see themselves as inseparable parts of the Body of Christ and strive to make love their way of entering into and becoming part of Creation.

Francis loved Jesus so much that when he prayed at Christmas people saw him holding the Holy Infant in his arms. We can do as much—it's not a stretch. We are no longer separated from God by our sins. Rather, the effect of Christmas is our salvation! Our prayers, our service and our hope have all taken on new meaning. We no longer wait for the Coming of Emmanuel. He is here with us, yes, we embrace him in our very hearts. And that is what the Sign of the Infant does. As the wise old man said in the Temple, "Now, Lord, you can dismiss your servant! For my eyes have seen the salvation of the world!" Now that we have this Gift—and its effect is transforming the world—how will we live the rest of our lives...?

When he announced this back in May, the Pope proclaimed: "Christian hope gives us the courage to build a fraternal and peaceful world when it seems barely worth the effort."

He encouraged us to "see the promise of good at times when evil seems to prevail."

The <u>Catholic Bishops</u> of Arizona point out the "**10 Hopes**" in this document that they urge the faithful to consider. Each reflects some aspect of Catholic **Social Teaching** – what following Christ in the footsteps of Francis is all about – being a bearer of peace, joy, and the fullness of life through actions of justice, mercy and love.

This year I hope to touch on each of these 'hopes' to at least some degree.

The 10 Hopes:

hope for peace over division,

hope for enthusiasm for life and readiness to share it,

hope for the openness to life and responsible parenthood,

hope for prisoners through restorative justice,

hope for the sick, those with disabilities, and those dedicated to their care,

hope for youth and young adults.

hope for migrants and refugees,

hope for the elderly,

hope for the poor and the hungry

hope for greater Christian unity.

The year begins with the World Day of Peace, January 1, 2025, whose theme is: "Forgive us our trespasses, grant us your peace."

"Only from a genuine conversion on all levels – personal, local and international — will true peace be able to flourish" this announcement said.

Once again, a reminder of our Franciscan emphasis on daily conversion.

XVII OFS General Chapter Rome, November 9-17, 2024 FINAL MESSAGE

Responding to Christ's call, in communion with the Church founded by Him and summoned by the gift of spirituality inherited from St. Francis of Assisi, representatives of the OFS and YOUFRA of the secular Franciscan fraternities from all over the world, have met in Rome, at XVII General Chapter, to reflect and agree on the future of our Order.

We feel overwhelmed by discovering that we are loved by God and that we are love, so in our hearts arises the need to send a strong message to everyone: **YOU ARE LOVE!** You, men and women who get up every morning to work, study, participate in social, economic, political and cultural life. You adults, young people, children... with certainties and doubts about your history; with dreams, hopes and fears... Each and every one of you, be assured: **You are love and you are loved!**

God loves you and from the first time he thought of you to call you to life, and until today, he has always maintained his love and faith. He is not distant or absent: he accompanies the day and shares the joys and sorrows. Discovering love that He has for us in our daily life, we can say that we are fully alive, only if we love. Just as Francis saw Jesus and was overwhelmed by the spectacle of the great love with which he was loved, let us indulge and allow ourselves to be touched, to be moved and to be inspired by Jesus and by each other! May our lives and our actions proclaim to everyone: "God loves you! And I love you!

The only desire of our seraphic father St. Francis was that all men should respond fully to their grace as sons of God in the Son, and become truly brothers among themselves. In the light of our Rule and way of life, may we always be conscious of the importance of everyday conversion. Let us be transformed and converted through our brothers and sisters. Let us keep the spirit of love in fraternities so that we recognize in everyone persons of dignity. Sharing Franciscan spirituality, let us put all our strength in renewing our fraternities so that we may become relevant and visible in Church and society. Testimonies of brothers and sisters as an example for accepting Gods will even in difficulties of life can help us and teach us to believe and rely more on God. Brothers and sisters, let us be mindful that true, deep love for each other, serving to brothers and sisters and our own humility can help us overcome all issues and problems in our fraternities. In this way, we will be able also to bring others: children, youth and families closer to God and to the Church. What enables us to rebuild the Church is to walk together, in humility of heart, in communal search and discernment of the Will of God. But we must start from within!

And as we believe and confess that we will only have a full life if we love and manage to transform ourselves from inside and as a consequence also transform and renew our fraternities, we are aware that the opportunity and hope for the world is the LOVE that we've been reflecting on during these days. We are called to bring the Gospel in to our lives and our lives in to the Gospel. How do we do that? By stepping out of our known and secure places, because we are called to live IN **THE WORLD** and with the world. How can we know how to do it? By putting our gaze on Him, the same Him that the Francis put a gaze on, when called to renew the Church. This same God has infused, within our natural freedom, the authentic miracle of the capacity to respond in love, which generates the challenge of availability to give life for others. And in this same miracle, He transforms us in His closeness of love for those who are near or far. He enjoys the joy of the child who grows protected and cries for the absence of the unborn and the abandonment of the unwanted; he dances with the joy of youth in hope, but feels the loneliness of the young man who isolates himself with fear and apathy. The sweat of those who work to bring home is appreciated by God and he stands in solidarity with those who bitterly pass-through unemployment. He walks the fertile path of the peace and searches in the ruins of war for those who try to survive. He sits down to talk in the house of those who enjoy stability, but walks with the migrant who seeks his opportunity. Dear brothers and sisters, isn't this also what we should do? What we are called to do and to live? Yes, it is!

Therefore, our message and our words are also a strong invitation: let us be transformed by God's love, let us BE LOVE to our brothers and sisters, let us love our fraternities and our brothers and sister in the humility of our hearts. Come, let us walk together, seeking and discerning in fraternity the path that leads to perfect love and charity!

Camino and H2O Project

After 2 months traveling in Europe, Steve and I returned to Arizona on November 26. Taking into account a lot of editing and organizing our pictures, we ended up with "only" 1300 of them (just for the Camino part of our trip). Many of you followed us on Facebook where I posted daily. Here are some of the highlights:

Our journey started on Sept. 25 when we flew out of Phoenix and arrived in Lisbon Sept. 26. The very next day, we started our walk out of Lisbon, stopping at the Sé de Lisboa (Pic 1) where St. Anthony of Padua was baptized. (Pic 2) There we received the first stamp on our credential (pilgrim's passport).

Along the way, we saw many beautiful shrines and churches, like the Church of the Holy Miracle in Santarem (Pic 3).







Our Spanish Speaking Group has grown stronger and is taking to heart their call to profession. As they work to master English, we are all working together to build up and renew our community.






Welcome Ceremony

Supporting a Refugee Family: A Journey of Hope and Resilience

Dear Members of the Region, Fraternities, and Secular Franciscans,

The Venezuelan family we have been supporting sends their blessings and heartfelt thanks for your prayers and support.

Fleeing from the socio-political turmoil in Venezuela, the family arrived with little more than their determination to build a better future. Our community has rallied around them with prayers and donations, embodying the Franciscan spirit of compassion and service. The collective efforts of our members have made a significant impact, reflecting our commitment to living out the Gospel values.

We are delighted to report that the children are thriving in their school environment. Camila has started 1st grade, Diego is in 4th grade, and Fabiana is now in 7th grade. Eithan, who is 2 years old, is doing well and has begun speaking both Spanish and English. In August, we joyfully celebrated Camila's 7th birthday, and in October, we marked Diego's 10th birthday with great enthusiasm.

We are diligently making monthly payments of \$350 to the lawyer's office to support their legal journey. Currently, there is a \$711 left in their legal fund account. The asylum application was submitted in June, and their next immigration court hearing is scheduled for June 2025. In October, they met with their lawyer to gather the necessary documents and initiate the process for requesting a work permit. Let us continue to pray for a positive outcome.

Thank you for being instruments of peace and hope. Your support in their times of need and your acts of love and mercy are deeply appreciated.
